

NEDS is dedicated to saving and enhancing lives through organ and tissue donation.



- Or, altruistic living donors

113,000 men, women and children are waiting for a life-saving organ transplant in the U.S. – imagine filling 3 stadiums!



The Need

On average 22 people a day do not survive waiting for their transplant due to lack of available organs

Every 10 minutes another name is added to the organ transplant waiting list

Approximately 1% of the deaths that occur each year present the right circumstances for organ donation

The vast majority of Americans report that they would donate their organs after death







Pre & Post Event/Activity Table Tips

Prior to the event review Table Tips sheet

NEDS will provide information & materials

Keep an event kit ready: signs in holders, brochures in holders, poster and Donate Life materials such as pens

Share photos – groups pictures are great!

Pre & Post Event/Activity Presentations

Prior to the event review Presentation Guide

Know your audience – age group, etc.

Practice sharing your story

Pre & Post Event/Activity Language is Important

PLEASE SAY

RECOVER rather than saying harvest

VENTILATOR rather than saying *life support*

DECEASED DONATION rather than saying cadaveric/cadaver

ORGAN PROCUREMENT ORGANIZATION rather than saying bank



Dispelling Myths

"You don't want my organs, I'm too old..
I've had cancer..
My health isn't great..."

All people should consider themselves potential organ and tissue donors—regardless of age, health, race, or ethnicity. Your medical condition at the time of death will determine what organs and tissues can be donated. Don't rule yourself out! No one is too old or too young to be a deceased donor and most major religions support donation. Newborns and senior citizens into their 90s have been organ donors. The health of your organs is more important than your age.



Dispelling Myths

"I would sign up, but will they save my life if I'm in an accident and see the heart on my license?"

Your life always comes first. Doctors work hard to save every patient's life, but sometimes there is a complete and irreversible loss of brain function. The patient is declared clinically and legally dead. Only then is donation an option.
