

















Coordinated Response to the COVID-19 Emergency

In February of 2020, NEDS activated its Serious Event Management Team to begin arrangements for the possible spread of COVID-19 to the United States. This group of NEDS leaders were already well prepared, as SEMT trainings and table-top exercises are an integral part of NEDS' emergency response preparedness plan. Since those early meetings and throughout the pandemic, NEDS moved proactively to ensure the safety and health of staff and to ensure the continuous operations that make saving and enhancing lives through donation possible.





Early in the pandemic on March 19, NEDS received its first delivery of coronavirus testing kits so that every potential organ donor could be tested. The safe and uninterrupted delivery of donation services to honor the donor's gift and to serve patients awaiting transplantation, as always, remains our top priority.

In June, NEDS created the Social Equity Workgroup (SEW) and charged this dynamic group with developing a work plan for NEDS to further engage with the communities it serves and specifically identify opportunities and projects to reduce racial health disparities with respect to access to donation and transplantation. On January 1, 2021, NEDS was the first in more than a decade to successfully merge its two federally-designated organ procurement organizations (OPOs), New England Organ Bank and LifeChoice Donor Services. The successful affiliation, begun four years prior, drove improvement, provided more lifesaving transplants to patients and created financial efficiencies for the health care system. The formal merger of the two OPOs will continue the drive for higher performance and more organs and tissues available for transplant.
